



### Part I. System Description

**General Description:** The Northeast Kansas Library System (NEKLS) consists of a mix of urban, suburban and rural areas in a 14-county region that includes more than 44% of the total Kansas population. A large majority of that population is within the Kansas City and Topeka urban areas, but even the more rural parts of the region are relatively strong. Some member libraries serve populations as low as 164.

Member Libraries: NEKLS has a diverse membership of 117 libraries, including:

- 48 Public libraries
- 50 School districts and private schools
- 11 academic libraries
- 08 special libraries, including institutional, corporate, tribal and non-profit libraries.

NEKLS regards all member libraries as full members, and does not have contracting libraries or associate members. Some services and grant programs may be limited to particular library categories, however.

Governance and Staffing: A full System board of 146 members (117 member libraries, 11 County Commission Appointees, 18 Executive Board Members) governs NEKLS and meets annually in August to approve the System budget. An 18-member Executive Board governs on a day-to-day basis and meets monthly. NEKLS operates from an independent headquarters, rather than in a member library. In 2022, NEKLS plans to employ a staff of eleven:

### Part II. Program of Services

This System Plan is a forward-looking document for 2022 and contains some information on 2021 activities at NEKLS.

The System's strategic road map identifies six strategic areas of focus: Exploration, Sustainability, People, Community Engagement, Core Competencies, and Critical Literacies.

NEKLS addresses these strategic areas of focus through a diverse program of services:

#### Continuing Education & Training

In the Spring of 2021, NEKLS completed an extensive renovation of its office building, including a reimagined training room capable of hosting 40 individuals. The technology supports inperson events, 100% virtual events (Zoom) and hybrid events.

- ✓ First Year Experience for new public library directors that places an emphasis on core director responsibilities. This requires a mix of trainings and support from NEKLS consultants.
- ✓ Collaborate with other regional systems on APPLE (Applied Public Library Education). For NEKLS, directors who have achieved one year on the job are eligible to participate.
- ✓ Ongoing development of content for NEKLS' new Learning Management System (LMS). The LMS offers pre-recorded content developed by NEKLS staff and recordings of live trainings facilitated by outside experts. Target audience is library staff and trustees.
- ✓ Supplement live trainings with a follow-up session to discuss how participants will put what they learned into practice.
- ✓ Production of a podcast that is easily consumed by library staff and trustees.

#### **Next Consortium & Online Resource Sharing**

Next, the shared regional catalog of 43 public libraries, one school district, one community college and the NEKLS system library, continues to grow in collection size and OPAC features to patrons.

- Ongoing support and enhancements of Next, which is a Koha ILS.
- ✓ Complete an Authority Control project to cleanup catalog records.
- ✓ Pre-recorded and live trainings for staff on how to complete tasks in the ILS.
- Pre-recorded trainings for patrons on how to complete tasks in the Next Catalog.
- ✓ Pre-recorded and live trainings on how to use e-resources available through the Next Consortium, namely *Flipster*, *hoopla* and *LinkedIn Learning*.

- ✓ Pre-recorded and live trainings on how to use e-resources available through the Kansas State Library.
- ✓ Enhanced marketing of the Next Catalog, Flipster, hoopla and LinkedIn Learning.

#### Consulting

The consulting needs of member libraries vary from year-to-year and NEKLS strives to remain in tune to these needs.

#### **Fundraising**

Public libraries often face a funding quandary. Ad valorem, motor vehicle and other taxes - on average - provide 75% of a NEKLS member library's revenue. Libraries must seek alternate sources of funding, such as grants and philanthropic gifts. NEKLS works with member libraries to develop a culture of philanthropy in their communities.

- Interested member libraries may establish a fund with the Northeast Kansas Library Foundation, Inc. To date, seven libraries have established a fund. Partner libraries enjoy access to a 501(c)(3) foundation capable of receiving, receipting and managing a variety of gift types, including cash, stock, and life insurance. The Foundation supports online giving and has a brokerage account.
- ✓ Provide one-to-one consulting to partner libraries on annual giving programs; grant writing; and capital campaigns.
- ✓ Provide marketing pieces that partner libraries can customize and use in their communities to promote gift opportunities.
- ✓ Offer all member libraries the opportunity to participate in Library Giving Day each April. Promote and assist libraries with use of the Library Giving Day toolkit found at https://librarygivingday.org

#### Other Ongoing Programs & Services

Several established programs and services continue through NEKLS and, in some cases, in collaboration with other regional library systems.

- ✓ Kansas Library Express NEKLS manages the statewide Kansas Library Express courier service (0.7 FTE NEKLS staff), which is subsidized heavily by the regional library systems and is partly funded by the State Library. As a result, even the smallest of libraries enjoys courier service at an affordable cost.
- ✓ On-demand architectural services provided by a Lawrence-based architect.
- ✓ Provide access to an attorney for legal assistance on matters related to human resources and land/buildings.
- ✓ Data mapping through in-house use of Policy Map, a GIS mapping solution that helps libraries to visualize the communities they serve.
- ✓ Recollections: Kansas NEKLS coordinates this statewide service providing online access to local history and community memoirs in the form of digitized documents, images and other files.
- ✓ Public Library Accreditation NEKLS has a robust accreditation program to encourage excellence from member public libraries. Eligibility for Library Development Grants requires a library to be accredited.
- ✓ Technology support and training is ongoing, and includes:
  - ✓ Contracting with e-Rate Solutions to manage the e-rate application process for member public libraries. NEKLS pays the commission for that service up to a maximum limit.
  - ✓ NEKLS continues to manage Kansas Libraries On the Web (KLOW), a program that hosts public library websites, the vast majority using WordPress. KLOW is a shared service of the Central, Northeast, and Southeast regional library systems.
