Study: 90% Of Americans Strongly Opposed To Each Other

"The vast majority of respondents signaled they were dead set against the U.S. populace, condemning in forceful terms the way others have handled things over the past year...," said Pew Research Center polling analyst Babette Randolph, noting that the rate of opposition remained consistent across all 50 states and virtually every demographic regardless of age, gender, race, religion, or political identification.



% who say they trust the federal government to do what is right just about always/most of the time




Consistent Liberals & Conservatives Often Live in Different Media Worlds

...name an array of main news sources




...trust more than distrust 28 of the 36 news sources surveyed




Consistent conservatives...

...are tightly clustered around one main news source





...distrust more than trust 24 of the 36 news sources




Little Overlap in the Sources Trusted for Political News

Trust Levels of News Sources by Ideological Group










Many users see social media as an especially negative venue for political discussions compared with face-to-face

% of social media users who say their political discussions are more or less ___ compared with other places people might discuss politics




41% have personally experience online harassment (66% have witnessed it)







% of U.S. adults who say ___ is a **very big problem** in the country today




Americans see made up news as detrimental to the country's democratic system

% of U.S. adults who say ___ create **a lot** of made-up news and information





Some news statements are more likely than others to be correctly identified as factual or opinion

% U.S. adults who classified each statement as factual or opinion



% of U.S. adults who correctly classified <u>opinion</u> statements as opinions



% who classified each **factual statement** as **factual**







% of U.S. adults in each age group who correctly classified _____ factual statements as factual




% of U.S. adults in each age group who correctly classified ____ <u>opinion</u> <u>statements as opinion</u>




26% of Americans have had false information posted about them




% of U.S. adults who say the issue of made-up news and information will ____ in the next five years




How much have libraries contributed to their communities?






How well, if at all, do your local public libraries serve the learning and educational needs of your local community – not just children at schools, but all those of any age who want to learn?

% of those ages 18+








Democracy

Democrats and Republicans more ideologically divided than in the past


Distribution of Democrats and Republicans on a 10-item scale of political values

Distribution of Republicans and Democrats on a 10-item scale of political values






Average divide across 10 political values, by key demographics




Rising 'antipathy' toward other political side

Republican attitudes about the **Democratic** party


Democratic attitudes about the **Republican** party



More Americans expect partisan relations to get worse than did so after three prior midterms


% who say relations between Republicans and Democrats in Washington will ____ in the coming year


