

NEKLS Snapshot: People, Libraries & Impact

Regional Reach

The Northeast Kansas Library System (NEKLS) serves a diverse 14-county region that includes urban centers, growing suburbs, and rural communities—home to over 1.32 million Kansans, or 44.93% of the state's total population. Most residents live within the Kansas City–Lawrence–Topeka corridor. While many rural areas saw slight population declines, some are experiencing modest growth. Thirteen NEKLS libraries serve towns with fewer than 1,000 residents.

Our Member Libraries

NEKLS supports 118 full member libraries, including:

- 48 public libraries
- · 52 school districts and private schools
- 11 academic libraries
- 7 special libraries

All member libraries are considered full members—NEKLS does not have contracting or associate libraries. While some grants and services are tailored to specific types of libraries, all members benefit from shared resources, consulting, and training.

Measuring Our Impact

SCHOOL LIBRARY GRANTS

- Collection development grants to schools totaled \$51,000 of funding to 15 school libraries in 7 districts.
- Since beginning collection development grants in 2018, NEKLS has awarded 122 grants, totaling \$280,750.

CONTINUING EDUCATION

NEKLS hosted 14 major continuing education events in 2024, These were complemented by numerous smaller training opportunities throughout the year.

- Focus, Mental Wellness, and Innovation grants.
- Continuing Education grants for conferences, workshops, and MLS courses.
- Mileage reimbursement grant for summer library programs to host performers.

CONSULTING

Six full time library professionals to assist you with technology, collection development, continuing education, fundraising, community relations, strategic planning, board development, and much, much more.

COURIER SERVICE

- 364 participating libraries
- 73,334 is the monthly average number of items shipped. The average cost is \$1.06 per item.

TECHNOLOGY

Over 70 library visits in 2024 for technology-related issues. Includes 50+ computers installed, 5 networks installed, as well as printers installed and a variety of other technology support. Daily remote and phone support.



Focus Grants: Transforming Libraries to Meet Community Needs

Through the Focus Grant program, NEKLS helps member libraries make bold, meaningful improvements to their facilities or services—projects that strengthen the library's role as an essential part of the community. Whether enhancing spaces, expanding access, or reimagining services, these grants empower libraries to create lasting local impact.

- Atchison Public Library received \$17,000 to renovate its lower level with new carpeting, fresh paint, and movable panels, allowing flexible use for programs and events.
- Morrill Public Library (Hiawatha) received \$15,000 to enhance its outdoor areas with landscaping and a new green space for community-involved gardening programs.
- Ottawa Library received \$18,000 to build new study and meeting rooms to support quiet workspaces and small group collaboration.

School Library Collection Development Grants

In Fall 2024, NEKLS awarded \$51,000 to 15 school libraries across 7 districts through a competitive grant programmed at expanding and updating library collections. Grantees will provide a grant report at the conclusion of the 2024-2025 school year. In 2023, NEKLS awarded \$48,000 to 18 school libraries across 10 districts that impacted 10,435 students and 392 educators and staff.

This grant program remains vital at a time when many school budgets can't cover basic collection needs. "Programs and events are important," Amanda noted, "but what school libraries need most is funding for books."

Spanish Language Collection Expansion

NEKLS invested \$5,000 in Spanish-language ebooks and audiobooks via the State Library of Kansas Cloud Library. In 2024:

- Spanish-language checkouts increased by 38%
- Title-specific circulation rose by 44%

NEKLS also partnered with Corazón de la Nación REFORMA, donating a themed basket to the KLA Education Foundation and supporting visibility at the KLA Conference. These efforts helped recruit new REFORMA members, energizing the chapter with nuevo vida.

Aspen Discovery: A New Chapter for the Next Catalog

In 2024, NEKLS launched Aspen Discovery, a powerful enhancement to the shared Next catalog. This discovery layer brings a modern, intuitive search experience to library users across our region.

With Aspen, users benefit from:

- Smarter search results that prioritize the most relevant and desirable editions
- Enhanced title information including rich descriptions and personalized recommendations
- · At-a-glance library info, such as open hours and local updates, right on each library's homepage

Aspen Discovery helps libraries put their best digital face forward—making it easier for patrons to explore, engage, and connect.

Continuing Education: Stronger Together in 2024

NEKLS delivered 14 major continuing education events, all provided at no cost to attendees, in 2024. These larger sessions brought our library community together for shared learning and support—including a full-day in-person retreat with Dr. Beth Wahler, who led us in exploring the role of trauma-informed care in public libraries.

We didn't shy away from hard conversations. Sessions addressed pressing challenges like responding to substance use, overdose, and the realities of fentanyl in library spaces.

As a response to these needs, we also launched a Mental Wellness Grant opportunity, empowering libraries to create local solutions and foster staff well-being.

Beyond these marquee events, NEKLS supported dozens of additional learning opportunities, from one-on-one consultations to just-in-time virtual trainings. In every format, our aim remained the same: to equip and uplift the people who power our libraries.

As we reflect on the successes of 2024, NEKLS remains committed to supporting and empowering our member libraries in the year ahead. Together, we will continue to innovate, connect, and strengthen communities through the vital work of libraries across Northeast Kansas.
